

Featured Resource: Texas Pretrial Practice



This month's featured resource is a new title from James Publishing. Texas Pretrial Practice is a great place to begin when your issues arise during a civil case. This two volume guide covers issues in regards to jurisdiction, pleadings, exceptions, TRO's and Injunctions, motions, discovery, interrogatories, summary judgements, and much more. The book takes you from taking a case from the beginning to trial and any specific issues in regards to pretrial procedure. Sections begin with a quick overview, defining any terms, strategies and tactics, related topics, and the relevant statutes and codes. Tips and strategies are included throughout including practice tips, cautionary strategies, and reminders. The book is written by Justice Scott Brister and Dan S. Boyd. Judge Brister has served on both the First and Fourteenth Court of Appeals and the Texas Supreme Court. Mr. Boyd has been an attorney for over twenty years in

In this column, we examine technology in the Law Library that you can use in your practice.

This Month's Featured Technology: Google Scholar

Need to lookup a case fast? Try Google Scholar. Searching the database is easy. Go to scholar.google.com, or search google scholar on the google search page. Once there, you can find

cases by citation or by keyword. Using the advanced search, you can use Boolean operators such as "and, or, or not" or by phrase. You can also search for legal articles or patents though the search engine. Federal and State cases may be searched. Texas cases available are from the Court of Appeals, Court of



Civil Appeals, Court of Criminal Appeals, and the Texas Supreme Court. Be aware that updates to articles or cases may be 6—9 months behind. For more information or a demonstration, contact the Law Library.

Texas Case Law Update

Local Cases

- <u>Monroe v. Grayson Lakes</u>, No. 01-16-00125-CV, (October 18, 2016): appeal dismissed. (400th Dist.)
- Evans v. Fuller, No. 14-14-01019-CV, (October 18, 2016): rev'd and remanded. (240th Dist.)
- <u>Sam v. State</u>, No. 14-13-00840-CR, (October 19, 2016): aff'd. (240th Dist.)
- <u>Powell v. State</u>, No. 01-15-00975-CR, (October 27, 2016): aff'd TC judgment. (400th Dist.)
- Taborda v. Tamirisa, No. 14-16-00545-CV, (November 1, 2016): dismissed. (400th Dist.)
- <u>Burks, Antwain Maurice</u>, No. PD-0992-15, (November 2, 2016): vacated COA; remand to COA. (400th Dist.)
- <u>Rogers, Demarquis</u>, No. PD-0992-16, (November 9, 2016): discretionary review refused. (268th Dist.)
- <u>Morrison v. State</u>, No. 14-15-00773-CR , (November 10, 2016): vacated and remanded. (240th Dist.)

Family Law

- In Interest of B.T.G., 494 S.W.3d 839 (Tex. App.—Dallas 2016): according to the Family Code, the trial court cannot remove a SAPCR suit from a divorce.
- Roderick v. State, 494 S.W.3d 868 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2016): it was held that the testimony by detective about the defendant's request to take a polygraph test was inadmissible due to hearsay.

Criminal Law

- Sifuentes v. State, 494 S.W.3d 806 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2016): despite the fact that the verdict was not guilty of aggravated robbery with a deadly weapon did not mean there was enough evidence to support simple robbery conviction.
- Mayer v. State, 494 S.W.3d 844 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2016): state must show that the defendant was aware she was in an accident but not that she knew she had caused death or injury.
- Walker v. State, 494 S.W.3d 905 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2016): there was enough evidence to support the probable cause for warrant to search defendant's cell phone.
