



Featured Resource: Lanier's Texas Personal Injury Forms by Jonathan Briggs

"Do you have a good form for _____?" It is a question every lawyer has heard or asked a

hundred times. If you are a personal injury litigator, prominent Houston plaintiff's attorney Mark Lanier's answer to that question is "Yes!" Geared primarily toward the plaintiff's side though useful to defense counsel also, Lanier's Texas Personal Injury Forms (in its Fourth Edition from Texas Lawyer/ALM Publications, 2017) provides almost 250 forms covering personal injury cases from the moment the client walks in your door through after the trial verdict. There are letters, petitions, discovery documents, motions, and various other pleadings and documents covering a broad range of issues. In a way, by putting these documents together what Lanier has provided is essentially a roadmap for conducting a plaintiff's personal injury case. It is available as a reference book in the library currently shelved in front of the Librarian's office and regularly shelved in the Library's Litigation section. Copies of pages of the book can be made for \$.10 a page. There is also an accompanying CD containing all the forms



available for use in the library. Stop by the Law Library and ask us about this book or other legal resources.


Technology Corner

This Month's Featured Technology: Locating U.S. Government Information Handbook

Finding Government Information on the internet can be a time consuming and difficult task regardless of the wealth of information out there. Fortunately, this guide by Edward Herman



and Thodora Belniak is here to help! This guide, now in its Third Edition, details what information you can find and how to find it. This guide starts with breaking down what Government Documents are and where they come from. Second, it briefly outlines Online Research and how you might approach the problem. Finally, it shows you all the different websites or locations where you can find Government Documents and how to use each site. These sites include USA.Gov, Data. Gov, FDSys and Government Publishing Offices Index, Technical Report Literature and more. They also go into detail on how to find Historical Documents either online or at a Depository Library. Texas Case Law Update

Local Cases

- Bradley v. State, No. 01-16-00375-CR, (October 19, 2017): aff'd TC judgment. (268th Dist.)
- Ex Parte Perez, No. 01-17-00196-CR, (October 19, 2017): appeal dismissed. (434th Dist.)
- Tramontina, USA v. FP Stores, No. 17-0258, (October 20th, 2017): review denied. (400th Dist.)
- Rahmati v. AJBJK, Inc., No. 01-15-01036-CV, (October 26, 2017): aff'd in part, rev'd in part, rendered judgment. (240th Dist.)
- In the Interest of A.J.L. and V.C.L., Children, No. 14-16-00834-CV, (October 26, 2017): aff'd. (387th Dist.)
- Meyers v. JDC/Firethorne LTD, No. 17-0105, (October 27, 2017): review granted. (268th Dist.)
- Catt v. Delozier, No. 17-0553, (October 27, 2017): review denied. (268th Dist.)
- Evans v. Palacious, No. 14-17-00693-CV, (October 31, 2017): dismissed. (CCL # 1)
- State v. Norris, No. 14-16-00455-CR, (October 31, 2017): rev'd and remanded. (268th Dist.)
- Haigh v. Citibank, No. 14-17-00683-CV. (November 9, 2017): dismissed. (CCL # 5)

Family Law

- In Re McPeak, 525 S.W.3d 310, (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2017): the statute that governs modification of the right to determine primary residence of child did not apply to the wife's motion to modify the court's temporary orders.
- In the Matter of I.F.M., 525 S.W.3d 884 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2017): it was determined that there was enough evidence to support the adjudication of delinquency based on the theft of property.

Criminal Law

- Olivia v. State, 525 S.W.3d 286 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2017): there was not enough evidence to support the defendant's conviction of a Class A misdemeanor DWI offense.
- Marks v. State, 525 S.W.3d 403, (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2017): it was a reversible error when the trial court allowed the State to amend indictments to charge defendant with a different offense.

Health—Experts

• Harvey v. Kindred Healthcare Operating, 525 S.W.3d 281 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2017): the discovery stay superseded the conflicting docket control order.
