

## Featured Resource: Alternative Dispute Resolution Third Edition



This title from Thomson Reuters fills an area of law that many have dealt with before, and this treatise gives those practitioners a full grasp of the subject. This two volume set begins with explaining Alternative Dispute Resolution and the benefits of it including when and when to not use the method. It is followed by the different kinds of Alternative Dispute Resolution and the process and procedures of it. Next, the book breaks down any statutory bases for arbitration. Finally, it delves into mediation and arbitration in various legal areas including Intellectual Property, Labor and Employment, and Family Disputes. The second volume also includes appendices, tables of laws and rules and a table of cases. This edition is written by Jay E. Grenig, Professor of Law at Marquette University Law School. Including teaching at various other Law Schools, he has also been a mediator and arbitrator in over 2,00 labor and employment cases, author of over 100 books and articles including many on Alternative Dispute Resolution, and has been a reporter for the Local Rules

#### This Month's Featured Technology: Microsoft Word for Lexis Advance

The Law Library has a trial for this new feature for Lexis Advance. This feature makes writing a Brief, checking citations and case law for accuracy, and inserting a table of authorities a lot less time consuming. Click on the Microsoft Word icon on the desktop and select on the Lexis Nexis tab at the top. From here you can do so many different functions including: simultaneous

searching (Lexis Ad- I - 0 vance. Lexis web. Google, and Bing); im-Motions, Pleadings)



from Lexis Advance, a document on the computer, or a flash drive; linking your citations and double checking them through Shepard's; and adding a table of authorities all with one click of the icons. For a demonstration, take an Express Class. Contact the Law Library at 281-341-3718.

### Texas Case Law Update

#### Local Cases

- Patterson v. State, No. 01-15-00167-CR, (August 16, 2016): aff'd TC judgement. (240th Dist.)
- <u>Simonson v. Colonial Savings</u>, No. 01-16-00278-CV, (August 23, 2016): appeal dismissed. (400th Dist.)
- Evans, Thomas Andrews II, No. PD-0418-15, (August 24, 2016): PDR refused. (CCL 2)
- <u>Young v. Dimension Homes</u>, No. 01-14-00331-CV, (August 30, 2016): aff'd in part, rev'd in part, and remand to TC. (400th Dist.)
- <u>Medical Discount Pharmacy v. State</u>, No. 16-0005, (September 2, 2016): review denied. (434th Dist.)
- Laguan v. Federal National Mortgage Assoc., No. 14-15-00952-CV, (September 8, 2016): dismissed. (CCL 1)
- Lemons v. Garmond, No. 01-15-00570-CV, (September 8, 2016): appeal dismissed. (240th Dist.)

#### **Criminal Law**

- Cole v. State, 490 S.W.3d 918 (Tex. Crim. App. 2016): the blood draw taken without a warrant after arrest for intoxication was within exigent circumstances exception to the warrant requirement.
- Tyler v. State, 491 S.W.3d 1 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2016): the taxi driver's information reported to police showed enough indicia of reliability to support the detention of defendant for purposes of investigation.
- Flores v. State, 491 S.W.3d 6 (Tex. App.—Houston [14th Dist.] 2016): the DNA test of the pillow could not have altered the result of trial which was based on the defendant's claim that was not supported by evidence.

#### Estate Planning and Probate—Wills

• Lemus v. Aguilar, 491 S.W.3d 51 (Tex. App.—San Antonio 2016): the handwritten will was not considered a last will and testament, holographic will, or a gift deed transferring property to grandchildren.

#### Transportation—Motor Vehicles

• Carrera v. Yanez, 491 S.W.3d 90 (Tex. App.—San Antonio 2016): appellants were not able to show that the driver was aware or should have been aware that car would overheat and stall which is required by the proximate cause element of negligence.
