

Featured Resource: Maslanka's Texas Field Guide to Employment Law



The Law Library has recently acquired the current edition of Maslanka's Texas Field Guide to Employment Law from Texas Layer/ALM Publishing. Michael Maslanka practiced employment law for over 34 years during which time he was also a frequent lecturer to attorneys practicing in the field. He is now a law professor at UNT-Dallas College of Law. This book gives a detailed and user-friendly overview on key topics relevant to both attorneys and laypersons, including: The Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) concerning such topics as leave from work following the birth of a child; The Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) covering such topics as minimum wage and overtime pay; The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) that addresses such topics accommodation in employment for people with disabilities; and sections from the Texas Labor Code concerning unemployment and wages. It is available as a reference book in the library

currently shelved in front of the Librarian's office and regularly shelved in the Library's Employment Law section. Copies of pages of the book can be made for \$.10 a page. Stop by the Law Library and ask us about this book or other legal resources.

This Month's Featured Technology: O'Connor's Online

In last January's Technology Corner column we discussed O'Connor's Online in the specific context of accessing Davis' Texas Estate Planning Forms. We wanted to revisit and expand our discussion of O'Connor's, a resource familiar to and long used by every attorney in Texas, but also relevant to laypersons on a wide variety of legal top-



ics providing both practical information and forms in such areas as Family Law, Estate Planning, and Civil Litigation...to name a few. *O'Connor's* is available in the Law Library both online via computer terminals 6 and 7 or in our extensive collection of *O'Connor's* paperbound publications. Copies of *O'Connor's* forms may be downloaded and printed for \$.10 a page. Coming in October, forms and information from the Federal Guides will also be on the database. Stop by the Law Library, and ask us for assistance.

Texas Case Law Update

Local Cases

- Ahmadi v. Moss, No. 14-16-00942-CV, (August 17, 2017): rev'd & remanded. (CCL 2)
- Human Biostar v. Celltex Therapeutics, No. 17-0289, (August 25, 2017): motion for rehearing denied. (434th Dist.)
- Grant v. Grant, No. 01-16-00581-CV, (September 7, 2017): aff'd TC judgment. (387th Dist.)
- Jones v. Anderson, No. 14-16-00727-CV, (September 7, 2017): dismissed. (CCL 2)
- Milton v. Nguyen, No. 14-16-00883-CV, (September 12, 2017): aff'd. (CCL # 4)

Criminal Law

- Queeman v. State, 520 S.W.3d 616 (Tex. Crim App. 2017): it was determined that it was not criminally negligent homicide even though that the driver failed to maintain a safe speed and a proper distance.
- Hopper v. State, 520 S.W.3d 915 (Tex. Crim App 2017): since the defendant having not exercised his right under the Interstate Agreement on Detainers was one of the reasons for the pretrial delay of more than 18 years, thus it weighed against him in speedy trial analysis.
- Moore v. State, 520 S.W.3d 906 (Tex. Crim App. 2017): in DWI prosecution, the automobile found to be deadly weapon was supported by evidence.

Education—Crimes

• State v. Rodriguez, 521 S.W.3d 1 (Tex. Crim App. 2017): defendant retained reasonable expectation of privacy when her dorm room was inspected by university officials.

Litigation—Discovery

• In Re State Farm Lloyds, 520 S.W.3d 595 (Tex. 2017): when electronic data is held in a reasonably usable form and is readily available, the trial court must find a balance between the burdens and benefits of having a different form.
