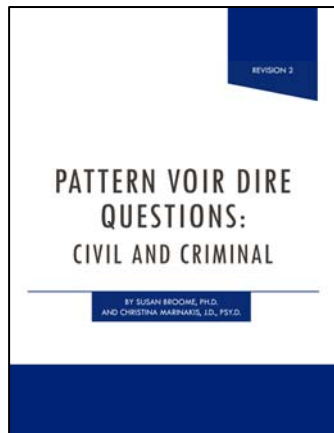

Featured Resource: *Pattern Voir Dire Questions*

Some attorneys go to trial several times a year; then there are lawyers who try one or two cases a year; and there are others for whom trial is a fairly infrequent occurrence. No matter what your trial experience or comfort level is with the trial process the newly arrived 2018 revised edition of James Publishing's *Pattern Voir Dire Questions: Civil and Criminal* will help you navigate the art and science of voir dire (a/k/a jury selection). It is user-friendly with a general table of contents and index as well as a detailed table of contents for each chapter. At just under 500 pages it is comprehensive without being overly dense. The first chapter is packed with general information and tips on voir dire practice and procedure. The following chapters thoroughly cover voir dire in civil and criminal cases...with standard questions for these types of cases and then specific questions depending on the nature of the charges (sexual assault, violent crimes, drug charges, property crimes, etc.) or causes of action (personal injury, business litigation, etc.). This book provides an incredible depth of useful and usable information and questions for potential jurors on almost any type of civil or criminal case you will encounter that will give practitioners confidence in conducting an effective voir dire on behalf of their client. Most of the material contained in the print copy of the book may also be accessed via the James Publishing icon on the desktop of all of our patron computers in Word or PDF format and may be downloaded for free to your thumbdrive or it can be e-mailed to you. This Month's Featured Technology: Scanning Documents in PDF Format

The Law Library has two multipurpose copiers that allow scanning to email or USB drive in PDF format. These can be used for easy e-filing. To begin, select the tab at the top labeled "Image Send." Then select the option on the left for "Address Entry." Then follow the instructions to enter your email address. You can also select "CC" to enter another email address. Once finished, hit the "OK" button. Next, hit the begin scanning button to scan. To scan to USB, make sure you select the "USB Memory Scan" tab after you hit "Image Send." Scanning is FREE in the Law Library. Ask a staff member for a demonstration.

Criminal Law

- *Cameron A. Marson v. The State of Texas*, 556 S.W.3d 924 (Tex.App.-Eastland 2018, no pet. h.): Defendant/Appellant was the passenger in a stolen vehicle pursued by Troopers Alston and Caro in a marked DPS unit. During the chase Defendant shot at the Troopers. The pursuit began in Ector County and continued into Andrews County. Defendant fired at the DPS unit in both counties. He was indicted in Andrews County for and pled guilty to two counts of aggravated assault of a public servant for shooting at the two Troopers and was sentenced to 25 years. Defendant was also indicted for the same two counts in Ector County. He filed a motion to dismiss the indictments based on double jeopardy. The trial court denied the motion, the case proceeded to trial, and Defendant was again convicted on both counts. On appeal the State acknowledged that its position was contrary to settled precedent but proceeded anyway to defend the second set of convictions by contending that each shot was a violation and that multiple violations occurred in each county. The Court of Appeals vacated the Ector County convictions and entered a judgment of acquittal, holding that the number of victims (2) is the allowable unit of prosecutions, not the number of shots fired.

Family Law

- *In the Matter of the Marriage of Lori E. Russell and Charles W. Russell*, 556 S.W.3d 451 (Tex.App.-Houston [14th Dist.], no pet. h.): Trial court entered a final decree of divorce. It later modified the decree pursuant to a motion for judgment nunc pro tunc by Ms. Russell. Mr. Russell appealed and brought a petition for writ of mandamus claiming the trial court lacked jurisdiction to sign the order and that the substantive changes made to the decree after the trial court lost plenary power made the nunc pro tunc order and modified judgment void. He also appealed the denial of his bill of review. In a consolidated action the Court of Appeals reversed the trial court's nunc pro tunc order and reinstated the final decree, finding that the changes were substantive and were made after the trial court lost plenary power.

Civil Litigation/Medical Malpractice

- *Melissa Wendt Ind. and as Exec. Of Estate of Donald Wendt v. Milan K. Sheth, M.D.*, 556 S.W.3d 451 (Tex.App.-Houston [1st Dist.], no pet. h.): Malpractice suit brought regarding death due to complications during heart surgery. Defendant anesthesiologist misidentified as "Smith" instead of "Sheth" in Original Petition. Name corrected via supplemental petition filed after limitations expired. Doctor granted summary judgment. Plaintiff/Appellant claimed that doctrine of misnomer of parties applied so as to allow the corrected filing to relate back to the timely filing of the original petition. Court of Appeals disagreed. Judgment affirmed.
